

# The Problem

Less than half of third-graders are proficient in English language arts, according to 2023 MCAS data.

Outcomes were significantly worse among Black and Latino students, English learners, students from lowincome families, and students with disabilities.

(Ron Noble, National Council on Teacher Quality, citing DESE data)



In Worcester, a mere **1 in 4** 3rd graders are proficient Worcester's ELA curriculum as of 2022 was not considered high quality (Amanda Taylor, WPS ELA Liaison, citing DESE data)





# **The Solutions**

#### How is Massachusetts performing on the five state policy actions?

Massachusetts ranks **above** the national average.

1	Sets specific, detailed reading standards for teacher prep programs	Strong
2	Reviews teacher prep programs to ensure they teach the science of reading	Moderate
3	Adopts a strong reading licensure test	Strong
4	Requires districts to select high-quality reading curriculum	Moderate
5	Provides professional learning for teachers and ongoing support to sustain the implementation of the science of reading	Moderate
